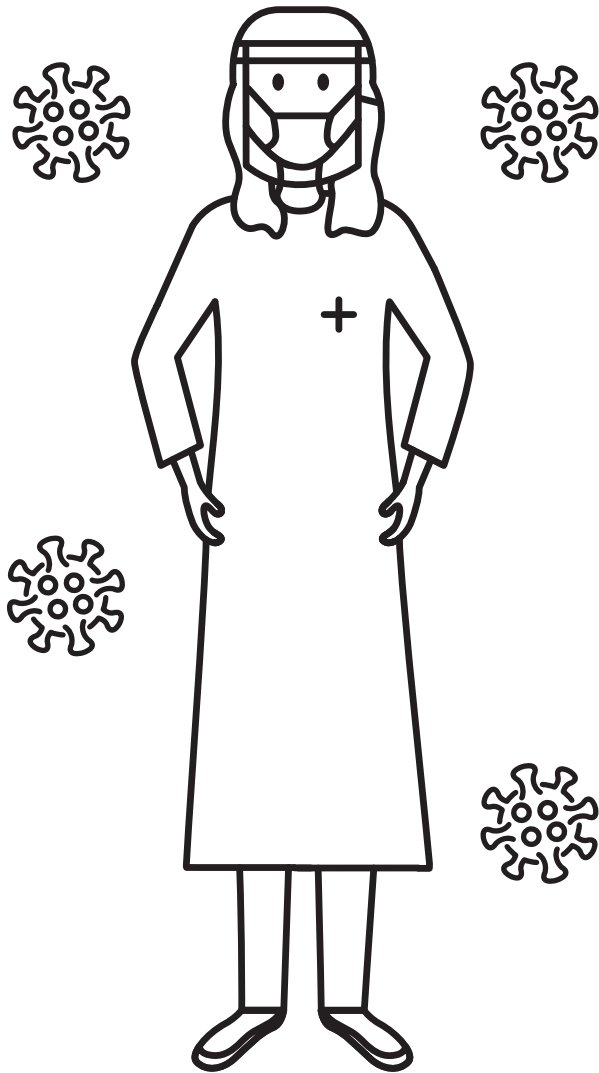


This is a picture of the suit!

Coronavirus is a virus. Viruses are germs that can make people sick. Other viruses you might have heard of are the cold and flu. Have you ever had the cold or flu?



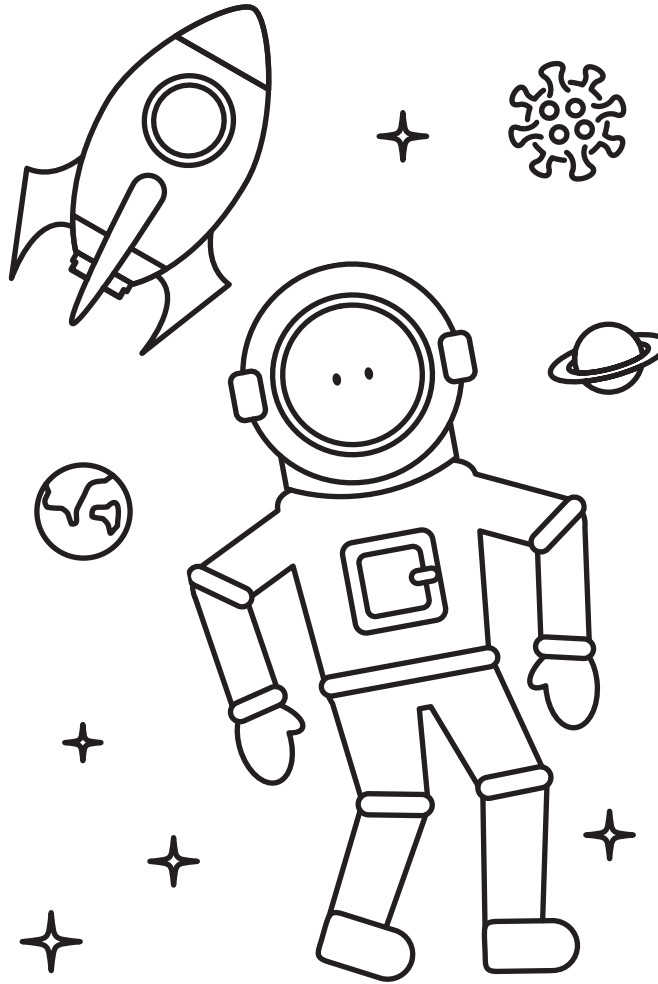

One way the doctors and nurses stay safe while helping people get better is by wearing a special suit.

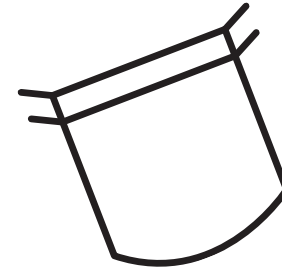


Some kids think it looks like something from outer space.



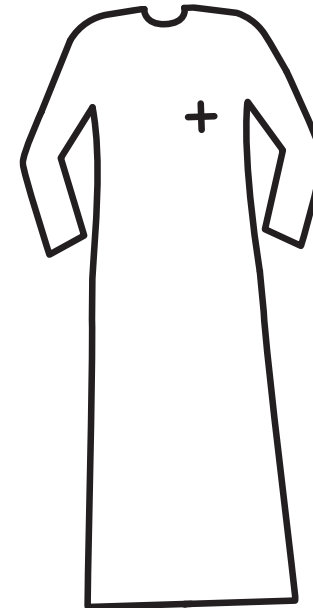
What do you think the special suit looks like?

This is the visor

This is the mask

This is the gown
